Northern Convenience Center Funding

- FY 24-28 CIP
 - Design Approved in FY25 Budget
 - Construction Anticipated in FY27*
- Desired site traits
 - Easily accessed
 - Strategically located within service area
 - Limited impact to surrounding properties



A Convenience Center is a Place To Take...

- Bagged Household Waste
- Compostable Food Waste
- Recyclables, including:
 - Glass
 - Plastics
 - Paper and Cardboard
 - Tin and Other Metals
- Special Waste Streams (hazardous waste, ewaste) may be offered





Tag-a-Bag Household Trash


- Compacted and removed daily
- "Cost Convenient"
 - Dropped at Convenience Center: \$2.00 per 32-gallon bag
 - Average local hauler \$31 per month curbside
- Tags available to purchase from local merchants or by mail

Hours of Operation


- Service Days: Six days a week in coordination with the other service centers
- Operations closed one day a week to facilitate emptying site containers, site cleaning and maintenance, anticipated closed day being Wednesday at the NCC
- Service Hours: 8am to 5pm




Where Will It Be Located?

Off Rio Mills Road, adjacent Berkmar Drive, north of the South Fork Rivanna


- **Brookhill Development** proffer #8

 - **Zoned Rural Areas**






Community-wide Benefits

- Access to residential bagged waste and recycling disposal for rural residents in the northern portion of Albemarle County, currently without a facility within 7-10 miles.
- Convenience centers proven to reduce illegal dumping
- Convenience centers proven to curbs open burning






Adjacent to Places 29-North CAC






Adjacent to Places 29-Rio CAC







Vicinity Map



RSWA Northern Convenience Center (NCC) - Visual Renderings Rio Mills Road, Albemarle County, VA















Visual Simulation #1 – From Rio Mills Rd Entrance at Construction Completion






Visual Simulation #1 – From Rio Mills Rd Entrance with Forest Regeneration













Visual Simulation #2 - From Berkmar Drive at Construction Completion






Visual Simulation #2 – From Berkmar Drive with Forest Regeneration



Next Steps

- 1. Receive Community Input at Places 29-North and Places 29-Rio CACs
- 2. Finish Preliminary Design Work Incorporating Feedback
- 3. Complete Comprehensive Plan Compliance Review
- 4. Planning Commission Review



Comp. Plan Compliance Review Northern Convenience Center

- Proposal to establish a convenience center for domestic solid waste management.
- Proposed activity/use is considered a public use per the County's Zoning Ordinance.
- Public uses are permitted by-right in all zoning districts.
- If proposed public use is not identified in the Comprehensive Plan/Land Use Plan, a review for the proposal's compliance with the Comp Plan is required (Required by Va. Code 15.2-2232).
- The CCP review determines if the location, character, and extent of the use is in substantial accord with the County's Comp Plan.
- County staff reviews the proposal, makes recommendation to Planning Commission.
- The Planning Commission acts on the proposal—makes of finding of substantial accord (or not in substantial accord) with the Plan.
- No action is required of the Board of Supervisors.
