"The group helped me to do things the right way and helped me take one step at a time to getting my kids back. Now, I see life and the way I do things more clearly and react to problems differently."

Fatherhood Engagement at ACDSS





What is an engaged father?

An engaged father is one who feels responsible for and behaves responsibly toward his child, is emotionally engaged, is physically accessible, provides material support to sustain his child's needs, is involved in child care, and exerts influence in child-rearing decisions.

(Pruett 2010)

At ACDSS, our goal is to give fathers tools, support, and resources to be engaged and active in their children's lives.

Why does an engaged father matter to a child?

Approximately 24 million children live apart from their fathers.

Children **without** an actively involved father are:

10x more likely to abuse chemical substances

20x more likely to have behavioral disorders

20x more likely to become incarcerated.

Children with an actively involved father are:

2x less likely to drop out of high school

4x less likely to grow up in poverty

7x less likely to have a teen pregnancy

They are also more likely to develop **healthy relationships** as adults, to have **greater self-acceptance**, and to **fare better economically**.



What is ACDSS doing differently?

Historically, public social services have a poor reputation for dissolving families and excluding fathers from their children's lives. This narrative presents a strong barrier for families to access the full range of benefits and services available to them through our programs.

ACDSS challenges this narrative through being a leader in our region for family engagement, particularly for incarcerated parents—many of whom are fathers.

At ACDSS, we offer the following programs and supports to fathers:

- Weekly group for fathers in the Charlottesville/Albemarle area
- Warm hand-off to benefits and community resources
- Supportive attendance at court hearings, school meetings, and other meetings
- Support for parents reintegrating into the community after incarceration
